Earth 'must be core business'

LOCAL government must plan for climate change as a "core business" just as urgent as rates and rubbish, a conference in Adelaide will hear today.

Dr Geoff Wells, lecturer for the University of South Australia's new online graduate certificate in sustainable business, says councils must embrace a change of attitude.

Dr Wells will tell the final day of the Beyond Carbon 2008 conference at the Mercure Grosvenor Hotel in the city that every council across the state can expect to be affected.

The conference is co-organised by the Local Government Association and the Committee for Economic Development of Australia.

Dr Wells says it is important to plan for the future using the bestavailable information.

"It's a question of just being realistic," he says. "Look at the science, look at the probabilities, start taking account of this and use the best tools that we've got.

"One thing you can't do is back away and say it's all too hard."



The Local Government Association says there have already been instances where planning development requests have been affected by the issue of climate change.

It announced last week it was investing \$600,000 in a climatechange strategy to combat rising sea levels and mitigate flooding.

LGA president Joy Baluch believes the LGA is being pro-active in its approach to climate change. "Rising sea levels have already

had an impact on the development approval process – with Yorke Peninsula District Council recently, backed by the Supreme Court, on a decision to refuse a coastal development application," she says.

Precedent alters mind-set

THE legal ramifications of climate change came to the fore this year when the Supreme Court rejected a Yorke Peninsula subdivision because of the potential for rising sea levels.

In what is thought to have been the first case of its type, the Supreme Court ruled on March 10 against an appeal by a developer for an 80-lot subdivision at Marion Bay.

A free public breakfast at the University of Adelaide this morning will raise questions about what schools and communities can do. sider the case after Northcape Properties Pty Ltd appealed against decisions by the Yorke Peninsula District Council and Environment Court to reject its proposal for the land.

The court heard the shoreline was likely to erode inland by between 35m and 40m over 100 years, which would affect an erosion buffer zone and a coastal reserve.

Guest speaker from the Australian Youth Climate Coalition, Amanda McKenzie, is running student sessions during the day.

She says young people often feel powerless but they can and are making a difference.

"We have so little time to take action on climate change that if young people wait until they are in positions of power then it will simply be too late," she says.
